


girls to always be themselves and to love who they are—inside and out.



Probably more rewarding a read is Paula

McLain's new book *Love and Ruin* about the marriage of Martha Gellhorn and Ernest Hemingway. Gellhorn was fiercely independent and ambitious, a WWII war correspondent and novelist. Hemingway never forgave her for leaving him. *Paris Wife* is McLain's novel about Hemingway's first marriage. The Gellhorn-Hemingway home is in Havana.
